Joint day-long event with the Waterloo Regional Heritage Foundation and the Waterloo Region Museum

Curtis B. Robinson, PhD Candidate, Memorial University of Newfoundland, will be our speaker. If his name is familiar, it's because WHS Volume 104-2016 includes his article, "Conflict or Consensus? The *Berliner Journal* and the Chief Press Censor During the First World War, 1915-1918."

Curtis is studying social history of intelligence and recruiting in German-Canadian Ontario. His topic for the meeting is "Security Measures in Southern Ontario in the First World War: An Historical Comparison." His research has shown that security on the home front was handled differently in Southwestern Ontario than it was in Central Ontario, or rather within the confines of Military Districts 1 and 2. District 1 was Toronto and Central Ontario and District 2 was Southwestern Ontario including Berlin. He writes, "Was it handled differently in Berlin because it was an historically German city or did the district commander have other priorities?"



When taking my dog Eli to daycare I had noticed a house at the Crowsfoot Corner, between Conestogo and Bloomingdale, that was marked for demolition. At the end of the driveway were two old lamp bases. I knocked on some doors but nobody seemed to know much about them. One person did give me a last name and with some research I found someone with that



me her daughter's number in Dubai. When I called the owner she told me they had been standing in the back yard for years and I could have them free for taking them away if I would use them. I hired a truck trailer and tractor, took them to a fabricator and we came up with the idea to rebuild one. I was able to find some acrylic light globes, had the lamp rewired, sand blasted, painted and then moved to my home. We mounted it in the back yard, installed LED bulbs and plugged it in!

I contacted the previous owner's nephew to find



where the lights originated and he gave me a newspaper article from 1956. They had been set up in his uncle's back yard until 2016. Now one is in my back yard for who knows how long! Another project will be to get the second lamp restored and working.

"Waterloo's Old Street Lights in Use Again," Kitchener-Waterloo Record, July 31, 1956

Retired briefly last year, Waterloo's 45 year-old street lights are back in business and ready to start the next 45 years. The standards illuminated Waterloo's King Street business section from William to Young Streets. Last November they were taken down and replaced with much brighter fluorescent units. Since most of the old standards were in good condition, the Waterloo PUC decided to sell them for \$20 apiece. The price included five unbroken globes on each standard.... 450 pound cast iron, steel standards....Mr. Ritter placed two standards at the entrance to his driveway and two on the lawn beside a barbeque pit.

Caption with the photo: "Motorists passing Crowsfoot Corner, near Conestogo, are surprised to see former Waterloo light standards on Harry Ritter's lawn. Mr. Ritter purchased them from the Waterloo PUC for ornamental purposes."

The book by Bill Moyer, This Unique Heritage: The Story of Waterloo County, page 97, has a 1910 photo of the street lamps. The caption is: "King Street in Waterloo (not yet paved) immediately after Niagara power was turned on in November of 1910. Experts said the five-globe standards made it the best lit main street in Canada at the time."

Laura Coakley, Research and Project Coordinator of the Social Innovation Research Group at Wilfrid Laurier University will be our presenter. Laura works in the Lyle S. Hallman Faculty of Social Work and is interested and passionate about the social history of poverty in the Waterloo Region. Under the direction of Dr. Sandy Hoy and Dr. Ginette Lafrenière, Laura helped pull together archives, local history literature and genealogical research to better understand the lives of people who lived at the House of Refuge between 1869 and 1951. Through this research, she helped develop a virtual museum to house archival information, stories of the people that stayed and worked at there, and the realities of poverty in Ontario in the 19th century. At the meeting, Laura will share some of those stories, what residents' lives were like on a daily basis while bringing to light the evolution of the

Poorhouse's existence over its 80 years in operation. She will piece together some of the social history of poverty over the 19th and early 20th century to give context to the realities for people living in poverty.



Sounds of Victory in the Waterloo Region, 11 November 1918 – Sara Karn

About Sara's talk:

The First World War witnessed unprecedented levels of noise, from machine gun bursts on the battlefields to the roar of aircraft engines in the skies above. While the ceasefire on 11 November 1918 at 11 am marked the silencing of weapons at the front, there was an explosion of sound across Canada in celebration of victory and peace. This presentation considers the aural aspects of armistice celebrations in Ontario, with a particular focus on Kitchener, Waterloo, and Galt. Using local newspapers, as well as photographs from the time, Sara examines the sights and sounds of celebrations, from organized parades to spontaneous gatherings in the streets. Through uncovering the sounds of victory, we can better understand how the war's end was experienced in the Waterloo Region.

About Sara Karn:

You may recognize our speaker from her article in the latest WHS Volume. Sara first moved to the Waterloo Region in 2016 to pursue a Master of Arts in History at Wilfrid Laurier University. Her research explored popular songs composed on Canada's home front during the First World War. As part of her graduate course work, she also examined how high school students at Kitchener Collegiate Institute contributed to the Second World War – her topic for the WHS annual volume. Sara currently works as a secondary school teacher for the Thames Valley District School Board and leads student battlefield tours for the Vimy Foundation.


The Seventh Generation – When Indigenous history becomes personal





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
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
